We know the only way to create a just world is to work alongside like-minded partners who bring their expertise, networks, and leadership to bear on the world's most enduring and complex issues. Pat Ryan, Jr., founder of Accelerate Institute, is creating a pipeline of education leaders. Ashley Wheeler, the Joffrey Ballet's artistic director, is providing access to the arts to students across Chicago. Chris Crane co-founded Edify to equip education entrepreneurs in developing countries with the tools and trainings they need. Liz and David Chandler introduced us to the Golden Apple's work to train teachers. Ron Levin co-founded Invest For Kids to help more youth gain access to opportunity. Robin King at the Navy SEAL Foundation and Craig J. Duchossois, board member of the Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation, both advocate for military families.

It's quite the list, and many more noteworthy leaders could appear on it. 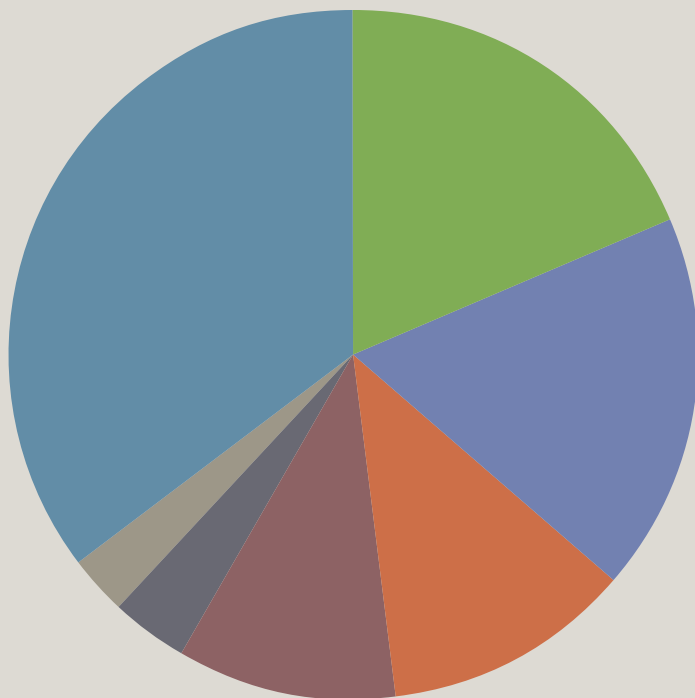

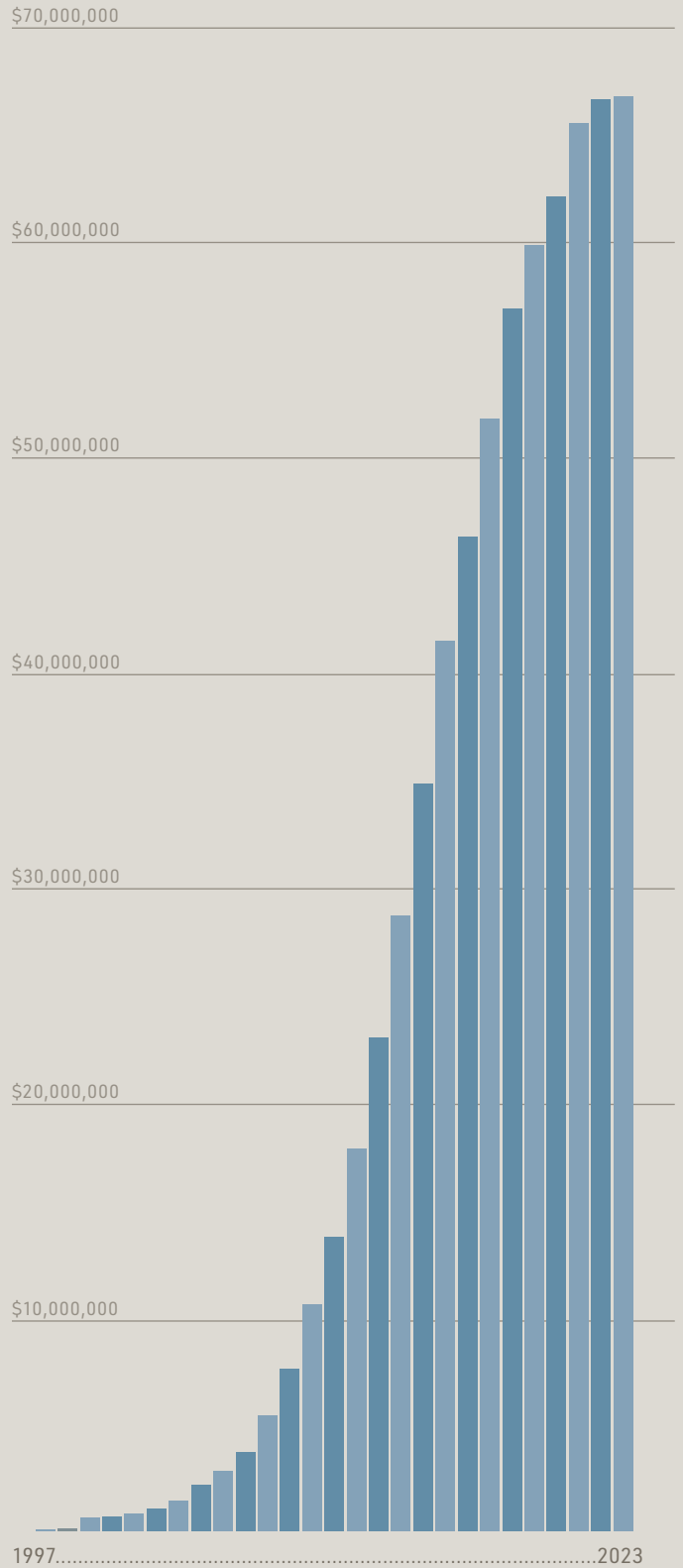
1997-2023 Funding by Location

U-Go

U-Go recognized that young women from rural communities with low incomes who had achieved a secondary education would have ambitions for higher education and careers that would enable them and their families to thrive. By providing long-term scholarships, the organization helps these women build a bridge to successful futures.



Pritzker Military Museum & Library

The stories of our country's citizen soldiers tell us much more than battlefield heroics. Their stories help us understand our history, our democracy, and our society. The Pritzker Military Museum & Library helps preserve the artifacts and resources that share soldiers' experiences, allowing new generations to learn from them.

New England Disabled Sports

New England Disabled Sports (NEDS) provides adaptive sports instruction to adults and children with physical and cognitive disabilities. Located at Loon Mountain and Bretton Woods ski resorts in New Hampshire, the organization offers winter and summer programs that enable participants to enjoy a range of outdoor activities they might not otherwise have opportunities to access.

ITS METHODS: Now in its 37th year of operation, the organization teaches skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing, and Nordic skiing in the winter and kayaking, paddleboarding, golfing, pickleball, cycling, and mountain biking in the summer. The programs are taught by as many as 230 volunteers, all of whom are trained to instruct participants of all ages with varying disabilities. The organization also engages occupational therapy interns who join the staff throughout the year. In addition, NEDS partners with veterans' organizations to offer free programming to veterans with disabilities.

ITS IMPACT: In 2023, NEDS provided 2,088 winter-sport lessons and 557 summer-sport lessons, serving a total of 538 individuals, 72 of whom were veterans. But beyond the numbers, the impact is significant: "It's about showing people that they can do more than they thought they could," says Kurtis Pierret, sports coordinator. The programs also benefit the athletes' mental health, says Jason Lafontaine, program manager, who's seen how the lessons lead to improvements in self-esteem, confidence, and relationships, in addition to physical fitness.

Longtime volunteer and board member Michael Cummings has witnessed the organization's impact firsthand. His son, Andrew, who has autism, has been a skiing student for many years. "While at NEDS, he was completely accepted. Multiple parents of students have said to me that NEDS is the place where their child feels the most at home," he says. "We don't define the students by their disability—we just look at their humanity and what we can do to help them make progress."

HOW THE SATTER FOUNDATION HAS HELPED: Along with unrestricted grants, donations from funders like the Satter Foundation—which Cummings introduced to NEDS—have provided essential scholarships to athletes. NEDS offers these on a sliding scale. "We don't want anybody to have any financial limitations to participate. So that's where donors come in," says Managing Director Terry MacDonald. Donations also help provide access in another important way: by enabling the organization to purchase specialized adaptive equipment, which can cost thousands of dollars.



WHAT'S NEXT FOR NEW ENGLAND DISABLED SPORTS

"We want to make sure that we can provide services for everybody—especially in the winter, when we often have a large waiting list—so we are looking to expand in other locations," says MacDonald. "We are also exploring how to create more accessible housing or lodging nearby." Indeed, NEDS sees a greater need for the services it provides. "Our goal is to grow to meet the need," says Pierret. "We try to teach a level of independence so our athletes won't need to come back to us every time they want to engage in a sport. Our goal is to work ourselves out of a job."

Heifer International

Established in 1944, Heifer International works to end hunger and poverty while caring for the Earth by providing smallholder farmers in 19 countries with opportunities to earn sustainable living incomes, access to bigger and more inclusive markets, and opportunities to build resilience.

ITS METHODS: “We help local farmers build agribusinesses that create a path toward a sustainable living income, by which we mean the minimum income that would feed, house, and educate a family of five,” says David Siewert, director of philanthropy. While Heifer International still runs its signature programs supplying livestock to individual families, in recent years it has focused on larger initiatives that result in more widespread impact. It now employs three main methods: mobilizing communities to form sustainable cooperatives, training farmers to improve agricultural practices, and connecting farmers to markets.

Its operating model is locally led; all its work starts by listening to the community to understand its needs and the interventions that will work to meet those specific needs. And, underlying everything is an eye toward environmental sustainability. “Climate change is affecting farmers. And it’s certainly affecting the marginalized poor in a dramatic way,” Siewert says. “We believe that with adequate training and the adoption of climate-smart agriculture practices, our smallholder farmers around the world can mitigate climate shocks.” The organization also focuses on cultivating women leaders, who are often the catalyst for creating sustainable and resilient change within a family and a community.

ITS IMPACT: As of June 2023, Heifer International had served about 46 million families. In addition, it has trained 7.6 million people on sustainable farming and business practices since 2012, 64 percent of whom are women. The cooperatives it supports have generated \$46.1 million in sales since 2019. The organization’s work has also created less-quantifiable impacts: For example, in many cases it has enabled young people to remain on their ancestral land, resulting in thriving, multigenerational communities. Plus, because it works at scale, it is able to amplify its resources. “For every dollar that Heifer invests in a project, we leverage another 75 cents,” Siewert explains. “That can come in the form of cash and in-kind contributions, or access to financing and bank loans.”

HOW THE SATTER FOUNDATION HAS HELPED: In addition to donating to Heifer as one of the foundation’s grantees, the Satters have supported the organization for many years by making donations in honor of friends and family. “Making a gift in someone’s name or by making a symbolic adoption of an animal or a hive of bees is a common way that donors are introduced to our work—particularly for families,” says Siewert. These gifts help spread the word about the organization and give people an understanding of the issues it is working to address.



WHAT'S NEXT FOR HEIFER INTERNATIONAL

“Our target is to serve an additional 10 million families in achieving a sustainable living income by 2030,” says Siewert. To do that, Heifer will scale through new partnerships with corporations and government agencies, which will provide further stability and reach. The organization is also focusing on ways to continue to mitigate climate change through its trainings and practices.

Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago

For more than 140 years, Lurie Children's has worked to ensure children can grow and thrive, no matter their socioeconomic or insurance status. It provides services in the hospital itself and in the surrounding communities, meeting kids and parents where they are to address vital health needs.

ITS METHODS: "Our goal is to keep kids healthy and safe where they live, where they learn, and where they play. And to the best of our ability, keep them outside of our walls," says Erin A. Markuson, senior vice president of development and campaign. "But when they need us, we'll be there to provide crucial specialty care."

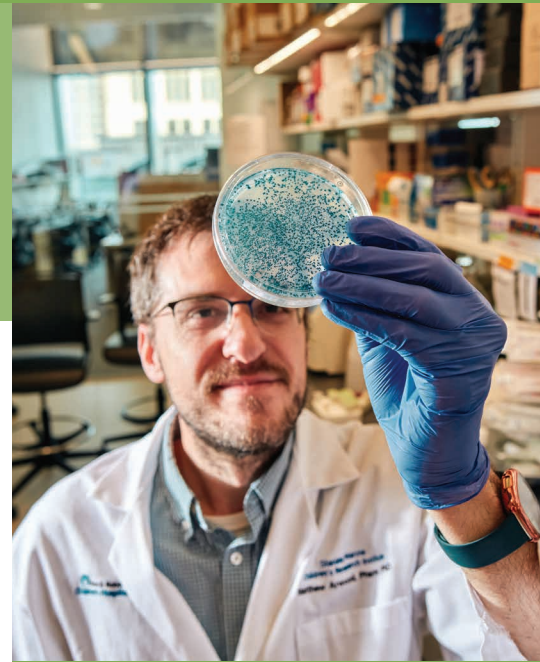
For example, in addition to offering world-class inpatient care, Lurie Children's operates a mobile health program that sends units equipped with clinical spaces into neighborhoods to provide vaccinations, asthma treatments, and follow-up care for children who have been recently released from the hospital. "We saw that many patients weren't showing up for their appointments downtown, so by bringing the care to the community, we've almost eliminated no-shows for one specialty's follow-up clinic. It demonstrates the power of going to where kids live and reducing the burden for parents," says Markuson.

The hospital, which is the clinical partner of Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, shares a biomedical research building with the university. There, both adult and pediatric medicine scientists work in the same space, allowing for collaboration and shared equipment and resources. "Children often are not the first priority when it comes to research, so Lurie Children's has been working to reverse that trend by providing multiple partnerships with pharma and external funders to develop projects that put kids first," says Markuson. In addition, the hospital

has been working on an advanced therapeutics project across the institution to better understand the specific genetic causes of illnesses, which will then help inform targeted therapies to enable better care for children.

ITS IMPACT: The hospital provides care for those who may not be able to afford it otherwise. In 2023, it supported more than 1 million patient visits, serving about 260,000 individuals. In 2022, the hospital provided more than \$231 million in unreimbursed care. It cares for patients whom other institutions may deem too expensive to serve and provides important services that insurance often does not cover, such as art therapy, child life specialist support, music therapy, chaplain and social work support, interpretation services, and more. "We also help provide for their basic needs and get on the right foot during difficult times by, for example, connecting families to resources for food, diapers, formula, and furniture, filling immediate gaps and connecting them to long-term services, too," says Markuson.

HOW THE SATTER FOUNDATION HAS HELPED: Donor support enables the hospital to be available to any child who requires its services, regardless of their family's ability to pay. The Satter Foundation's unrestricted support, for example, contributes to Lurie Children's ability to take advantage of emerging opportunities to improve and expand services and research. "That type of support enables us to open our doors as widely as possible," Markuson adds.



WHAT'S NEXT FOR LURIE CHILDREN'S

The hospital aims to make use of \$100 million in federal funding for research to continue to advance various fields in ways that mean more children will make it through their diagnosis and survive their medical condition—while they and their families will have what they need to thrive.

U-Go

U-Go provides long-term scholarships to young women from rural communities with low incomes, giving them the opportunity to pursue higher education. The scholarships propel them into steady and meaningful careers, enabling them to help support their parents, siblings, and families into the future. These young women may then create a ripple effect that helps their communities and nations to develop.

ITS METHODS: U-Go—which currently operates in Bangladesh, Cambodia, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines, Tanzania, and Vietnam—works with local partners to identify young women who most likely would not have the opportunity to pursue higher education. “Our goal is to help at least 100,000 young women finish university and begin careers that have social impact in their communities, which will include careers in medicine, education, technology, and engineering,” says John Wood, founder and CEO.

The idea for U-Go evolved from Wood’s experience founding Room to Read, which works to improve literacy and gender equality by providing girls with primary educations. (Room to Read is also a Satter Foundation grantee.) “Whenever I visited villages where we worked, I would be approached by a parent or a grandparent who would tell me, ‘My daughter (or granddaughter) is not done yet. She wants to be a nurse, a doctor, a teacher. She wants to go to university and have a career.’” Wood realized that the cost of tuition for these girls could be as low as \$800 a year, so he and a handful of close friends began to provide scholarships, often partnering with former Room to Read staff members who had gone on to start nonprofits providing scholarships on a local level. These partnerships became the root of U-Go. “Establishing U-Go became

a logical next step,” says Wood, who discovered that while there are hundreds of NGOs working on female empowerment, most do not support girls beyond their secondary education. U-Go fills that gap, pledging to support students with long-term scholarships that last through their graduation from university.

ITS IMPACT: “U-Go aims to have exponential impact, because when a young woman makes a marginal dollar, she spends 90 percent of it on her family,” says Wood. Since its founding, the organization provided scholarships to 2,500 young women and will increase that to 4,200 in 2024. Wood and his team aim to increase the class size by 25 percent every year for 20 years to eventually reach 100,000 scholars.

HOW THE SATTER FOUNDATION HAS HELPED: The foundation’s grants will underwrite scholarships for 100 young women over four years. Wood cites this long-term support as critical to the success of the organization, while also pointing to the value of the relationship he has had with the foundation since founding Room to Read. “Muneer was one of our first donors, and here we are 20 years later, and Room to Read has impacted 38 million children. We’re partnering to once again be a fast-moving social start-up that we hope to scale at a similar pace,” he says.



WHAT’S NEXT FOR U-GO

In the short term, the organization is working to scale its operations in the countries in which it is already working by building the capacity of its on-the-ground partners and seeking out new local collaborators. It will then turn its sights to expanding to other countries. While scaling is the goal, Wood is careful to employ a strategy that will ensure sustainability: “There’s more than enough work for us to do in the countries we are in, and we won’t move into another country until we are sure we are fully financed there,” he says. “We’re sticking to the strategy we’ve seen work.”

Pritzker Military Museum & Library

The Pritzker Military Museum & Library aims to increase understanding of military history, military affairs, and national security through the stories and perspectives of citizen soldiers. Later in 2024, the museum and library will move its operations from Chicago to the Pritzker Military Archives Center in Somers, Wisconsin.

ITS METHODS: “We cover historical events from the perspective of the individual in ways other institutions don’t,” says Roberto Bravo, interim president. “We cover all conflicts, all branches of the military, and current affairs because the citizen-soldier experience never ends, no matter where they are. Their experience—and how the acts of these individuals shape our experience as civilians—is what drives our work.”

The museum and library was founded by Lieutenant Colonel Jennifer Natalya Pritzker, US Army (retired), and established with her personal collection of objects and materials. Its collection has grown significantly over the years, spurring the organization to find more space and a facility that could better aid in the conservation of its holdings. In addition to creating greater ability to store and preserve materials, the new Pritzker Military Archives Center will provide 9,400 square feet of public space.

ITS IMPACT: The museum collection consists of more than 40,000 items and more than 65,000 book titles and is projected to grow. It meets its mission to educate citizens across the country by sharing compelling and vital stories

through its blogs, newsletters, and 600 episodes of video programming related to the citizen soldier, military history, and current events. It circulates between 1,500 and 2,000 books a year nationwide through interlibrary loans, and it runs interactive, virtual programs for educators and students.

The collection has largely grown organically, as many people are glad to have a suitable place to deposit the artifacts and stories of their loved ones—or their own. “Much of the reason that people trust us with their cherished artifacts and documents is because they’re not just going to get put in a box and set aside. The stories are going to be told to future generations,” says Susan Rifkin, chief operating officer of philanthropic activities.

HOW THE SATTER FOUNDATION HAS HELPED: The Satter Foundation has supported the museum for close to a decade, in recognition of the importance of understanding the role of the military in our history and those who served to protect our country. “We feel that our donors are our partners,” says Rifkin. “We spend time understanding their goals and how their values align with our own.”




WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE PRITZKER MILITARY MUSEUM & LIBRARY

The organization is focusing on how it can make its collection accessible to those who don't have the capability to visit the new facility. “We have built a state-of-the-art digital lab so that our entire collection can be viewed online,” says Bravo. The museum and library's new location has given the organization a sense of endless possibilities for how it can carry out its mission. “More than anything,” Bravo says, “the new building inspires us to live up to its grandiosity.”
