## FOUNDERS' LETTER

We opened our previous annual report reflecting on the challenges the COVID-19 pandemic has imposed on communities across the globe. In many ways, the obstacles we faced in 2021 were a continuation of these challenges. As the world withstood the second year of a pandemic, lives and livelihoods were lost, a generation of students' education was disrupted, and we remained isolated from the people and activities we relied on for daily joy. As a society, we also continued to contend with racial and economic inequities that sparked meaningful conversation while also emphasizing the long and sometimes divided road ahead.

And yet, as was the case last year, we still feel a strong sense of hope. Indeed, if anything, that hope is stronger, as we have seen more people and organizations than ever stand up for a better future despite more than two years of ongoing uncertainty and struggle. In 2021, we watched as young people spoke up and advocated to change the world they will inherit for the better. We witnessed the distribution of innovative vaccines that targeted a novel virus. We saw the delight of those who were finally able to safely reunite with loved ones. We found inspiration in the tireless work of the Satter Foundation grantees, who brought ingenuity and bold ideas to meet the needs of the communities they served.

For example, the Greater Chicago Food Depository, Illinois COVID-19 Response Fund, AmeriCares, Doctors Without Borders, and others met vital, immediate needs for those facing severe scarcity or other crises. Organizations such as Above and Beyond Family Recovery Center tended to those feeling the strain of mental-health issues, while the health-care centers and researchers the foundation supports ensured patients did not forgo essential care. Our many education-focused grantees around the globe did all they could to provide students with stable and effective learning environments. Through it all, grantees such as Human Rights Watch and the Bridgeway Foundation did not back down from increasing threats to human rights and continued atrocities.

We draw hope from all that Satter Foundation grantees do and from how they do it—particularly how they use the networks they've nurtured to multiply the scale of their impact exponentially. These organizations know that seismic change comes not from individuals working alone, but from communities acting in concert. They understand the importance of partnership, and our world is better off for their creativity and collaborative spirits. You'll read examples of grantees that display this approach in the pages that follow. Their impact is extensive and long-lasting.

The organizations the Satter Foundation supports use their steadfast leadership, innovative thinking, and drive to help their communities and the environment overcome more obstacles than ever in the past year. They never, ever gave up, and neither will we. Our hope for a brighter future has not flagged, because our faith in our grantees has never wavered. 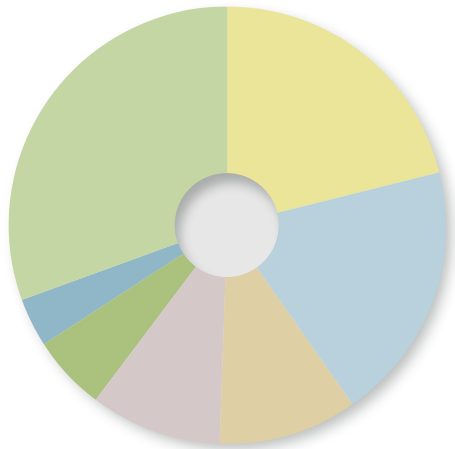

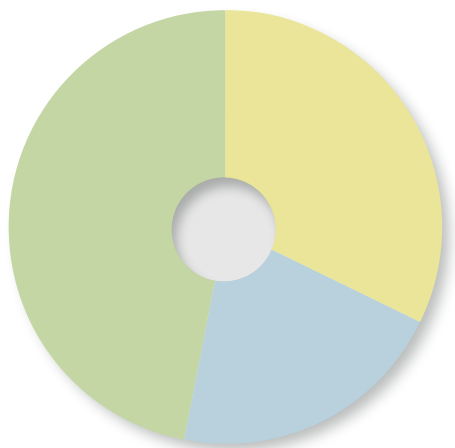

## 2021 FUNDING BY LOCATION



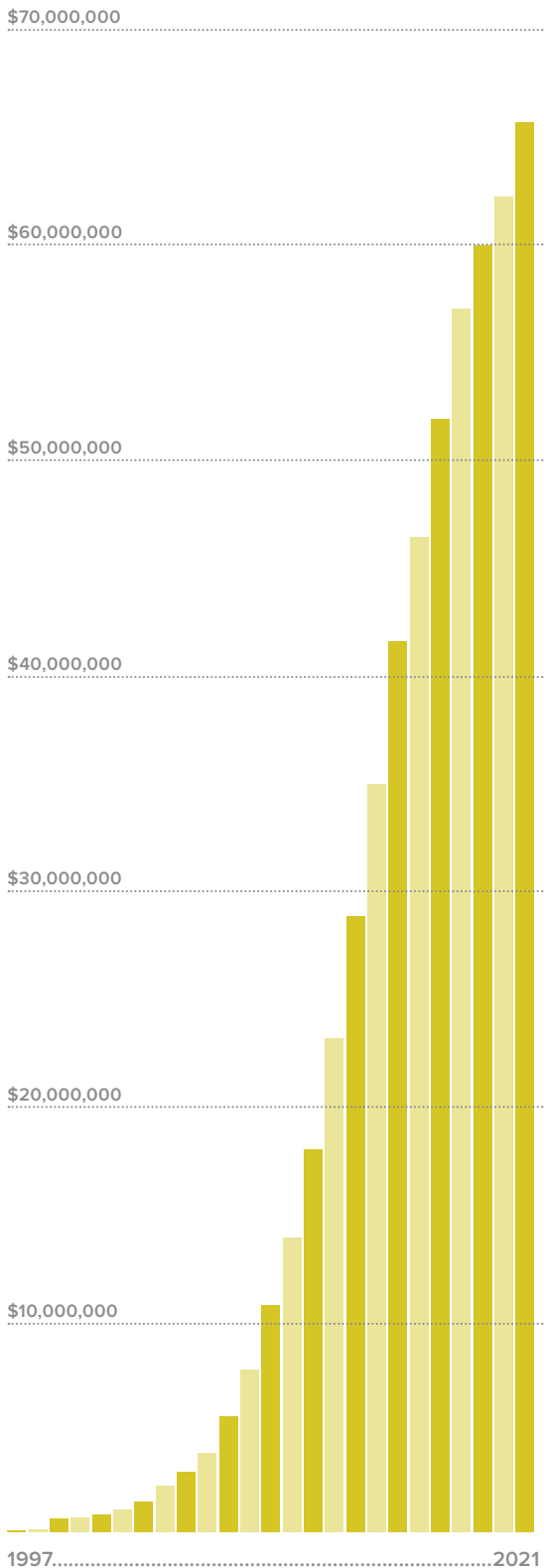

## finding power in community

In a time when so many have struggled with isolation, the transformative power of community has rarely felt so relevant. Satter Foundation grantees have seized this moment to deepen their ties with the communities they serve, forging true partnerships that allow them to multiply their impact. As we will share in the pages that follow, these 2021 grantees demonstrate that we are always stronger when we lift one another up.

### PATHWAYS.ORG

The first weeks and months of a baby's life can be a stressful and isolating time for new parents, but Pathways.org provides the reassurance that they aren't alone. With its trustworthy, easy-to-follow resources, backed by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the organization equips parents with the tools and knowledge to prepare their babies to thrive.

### THE CHICAGO COMMUNITY TRUST

As a century-old community foundation, The Chicago Community Trust allows donors, grant recipients, foundations, and corporate partners to pool their efforts in pursuit of "moon shot" goals to advance the region that would be out of any one individual's reach. The Trust's We Rise Together initiative has received \$44 million in commitments from donors and strategically disbursed more than \$18.6 million in grants to support transformational neighborhood anchor projects, employment opportunities, and local businesses—a powerful example of neighbors helping neighbors.





## SPIRIT OF AMERICA

The United States has made a significant investment in personnel around the world through military and diplomatic channels. Spirit of America helps multiply the impact of this investment by bringing private-sector resources, speed, and flexibility to support these efforts. Whether it's by using US military bases to coordinate the evacuation of Afghan refugees or providing lifesaving gear and supplies to Ukrainians defending their freedom, Spirit of America functions as an essential connector and entrepreneurial partner to organizations promoting freedom around the world.

## 100 CLUB OF ILLINOIS

The 100 Club's name is a symbol of the power of togetherness: In 1956, the organization's founder gathered 100 friends and community members to support the family of a first responder who died in the line of duty. Today, the organization's Illinois chapter still facilitates that collective safety net for families of fallen heroes, now on an exponentially larger scale. Recently, it also began partnering with mental-health and wellness providers to improve the quality of life for currently serving first responders.

## INVEST FOR KIDS

By focusing its grant making on smaller, high-performing organizations that serve Chicago's youth, Invest For Kids provides a level of support for its grantees that goes beyond the check. Invest For Kids' support serves as a powerful endorsement, potentially raising the profile of its grantees with other area funders. In addition, Invest For Kids' annual conference creates a community of investment professionals who are passionate about giving back.

Founded in 1985 by Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan, Pathways.org is a nonprofit educational foundation that empowers parents to help their babies meet motor-, sensory-, and communication-development milestones. With a particular focus on early detection and early intervention for babies, the organization develops and distributes evidence-based, parent-friendly content via its website and other accessible platforms.

**Its methods:** Pathways.org collaborates with a team of experts, including pediatric physical and occupational therapists and speech-language pathologists, to share reliable and timely information about infant development with parents. “Babies make one million neural connections every second, so our ability to make an impact during that time is huge,” says Vice President Sarah Babula. The organization works to meet parents where they are and provide verified, actionable information they can benefit from. It also ensures the information is neutral and nonjudgmental. “Becoming a parent comes with enough anxiety on its own, so we make sure that all language we use in our content is very positive and empowering,” says Babula. As parents use new avenues to find information, Pathways.org has evolved its approach to now focus on building a stronger digital presence beyond its website, including a YouTube channel, social media, and online training courses. It also develops printed Milestone Guides that enable parents without digital access to use Pathways.org resources.

**How the Satter Foundation has helped:** The Satter Foundation is proud to be a small part of Pathways.org’s far-reaching, impactful work and has been inspired by its ability to organically evolve its content and be responsive to new research and relevant topics in parenting over many years.

**What’s next:** In 2022, Pathways.org will launch a full-scale mobile application for parents. Using algorithms and machine learning, the app will deliver digestible content to parents that is appropriate for the specific developmental stage of their child. “The app will allow parents to follow their child’s development in a more customized, interactive way, and will make it easier to discuss milestones with their doctor,” explains Babula. The mobile app will also enable Pathways.org to expand its reach and influence. “We will continue to develop new tools to help us push reliable information to parents so every baby reaches its full potential,” says Babula.

**Its Impact:**

In 2021, more than 42 million people from every country (with the exception of North Korea) used Pathways.org materials. Parents viewed more than 235,000 hours of video content, and the organization distributed more than five million brochures and 4,000 Milestone Guides. Trusted by both parents and health-care providers, Pathways.org’s tools have helped improve early detection of developmental delays in babies to ensure the best possible outcomes. Roughly 600,000 babies are born at risk for early delays each year and less than half of those delays are identified early. “That’s why parent outreach is critical, and we do believe that some detection is happening earlier,” says Babula. For example, cerebral palsy has traditionally been diagnosed when a child is about two years of age or older. Now, Pathways.org’s resources support parents and providers to diagnose cerebral palsy as early as six months. “That impact has been huge,” Babula notes.

# THE CHICAGO COMMUNITY TRUST

The Chicago Community Trust, in partnership with generous donors and committed partners, seeks to create a Chicago region where people of all races, places, and identities can reach their potential.

**Its methods:** For more than 100 years, The Chicago Community Trust has served as a central convener and issue-area expert for Chicago philanthropy. Through the donor-advised funds it hosts and its organizational initiatives, the Trust helps donors connect their philanthropy to impact, leading to meaningful change in the Chicago region and beyond. To this end, the Trust unveiled a 10-year strategic plan in 2019 with the goal of addressing the root cause of many of Chicago's ongoing challenges: the racial and ethnic wealth gap. Currently, 12 of Chicago's 13 most economically stressed communities are majority Black or Latinx. The Trust is working to address this systemic imbalance through short-term emergency relief and long-term systems change.

One on-the-ground example of this work is the Trust's initiative We Rise Together, which is committed to making sure that as Chicago's economy recovers from the COVID-19 pandemic, Black and Latinx communities are not left behind. Launched in October 2020, We Rise Together is a coalition of corporate and philanthropic funders and communities focused on spurring development in disinvested neighborhoods, promoting employment resilience, and strengthening businesses owned by people of color.

**How the Satter Foundation has helped:** At the request of former Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel, the Satter Foundation has supported The Chicago Community Trust with a multi-year commitment to advance efforts to increase educational and job opportunities.

**What's next:** Now three years into its strategic plan, the Trust continues to develop and launch initiatives to grow household wealth, catalyze neighborhood investment, and build residents' collective power. One area of this work that will continue to grow in the coming years is the Trust's focus on improving opportunities for homeownership. By promoting financing solutions, policy reform, affordable housing development, and community ownership models, the Trust will continue to help make sure homeownership is fully accessible to all.

## Its Impact:

Since its launch, the We Rise Together initiative has received more than \$44 million in donor commitments and has awarded more than \$18.6 million in grants. And through its Fund for Equitable Business Growth, the Trust has funded business-support organizations that have uplifted more than 1,000 Black- and Latinx-owned small businesses, helping them create or retain more than 800 jobs. In addition, We Rise Together and the Corporate Coalition of Chicago launched 5/25 Move to Action, engaging 25 corporate partners to make commitments to a more inclusive business climate in Chicago.

# SPIRIT OF AMERICA

Spirit of America is a nonprofit organization that supports the missions of deployed United States personnel around the world, promoting initiatives that show and advance the promise of a free and better life. Whether by partnering with the US Armed Forces, diplomatic personnel, or local organizations in priority countries, Spirit of America advances the best of American values through nimble, need-driven support.

**Its methods:** “Spirit of America partners and collaborates with America’s troops and diplomats all around the world to support them and the people they help, wherever they’re serving,” says Founder and CEO Jim Hake. Founded in response to the September 11 terrorist attacks, Spirit of America has stationed members of its team around the globe. Its unique partnership with the US Department of Defense empowers it to work alongside deployed US troops and provide private assistance to meet the local needs they identify—the only organization approved to do so. By layering its own entrepreneurial nimbleness on top of the military’s existing efforts, Spirit of America can respond quickly and powerfully wherever its help is needed.

**How the Satter Foundation has helped:** The foundation is proud to support innovative and insightful founders like Hake. By making ongoing investments, the foundation aims to help position Hake and his team to continue to respond quickly and effectively the moment a need arises while continuing to work toward long-term priorities.

**What’s next:** The year 2022 is already a busy one for Spirit of America as it works with the US military and State Department to support Ukrainians in their fight to defend democracy. During the first month of the conflict, Spirit of America provided more than 52 tons of gear and supplies to Ukrainian forces, including medical supplies, food, helmets, body armor, and communications equipment. And the organization’s work will only grow from here: It is in the process of doubling its staff and scaling up its efforts around the world. The organization’s leadership is confident that with more staff and more capacity, it can move closer to its goal of protecting and advancing democracy anywhere it is threatened. Even better, it has seen that the world is hungry for opportunities to support its work. “Spirit of America is the embodiment of patriotism without politics,” says Hake. “And when you give people the opportunity to help the country in that way, there are still lots of Americans across the spectrum who say yes.”

## Its Impact:

Throughout 2021, Spirit of America provided long-term and crisis-response support via 56 projects in 25 countries, facilitating the safety and security of nearly 650,000 civilians. Perhaps the most visible example of its work came in August, when Afghanistan’s capital city of Kabul fell to the Taliban. The resulting refugee crisis was an all-hands-on-deck scenario, and Spirit of America used its relationship with US Central Command to help organize flight manifests and get at-risk Afghans to the Kabul airport for evacuation. “There’s no playbook in a situation like that,” says Hake. “But because we could build on the investment that the United States has already made around the world, we could act fast and see large-scale effects from modest investments.”

In addition to helping thousands of civilians evacuate, Spirit of America distributed essential resources like clothing and sanitary products to more than 30,000 evacuees on US military bases in Qatar, Germany, and Kosovo. And when a plane carrying 121 Afghan refugees needed a host organization in order to land, Spirit of America secured landing clearance in Albania. It continues to cover living expenses for all 121 of these evacuees, including 38 children—nearly all of whom have now arrived safely in the United States.

In the 55 years since its founding, the 100 Club of Illinois has provided financial support to families and loved ones of first responders who lost their lives in the line of duty. Recently, it has extended additional financial and wellness support to active-duty first responders, allowing the organization to honor and uplift more heroes and their families.

**Its methods:** The 100 Club of Illinois jumps into action the moment it hears that a first responder has died in the line of duty, sending representatives to hospitals or homes to comfort and guide family members through immediate issues, such as funeral planning or unpaid bills. Over the longer term, the 100 Club also provides bereaved families with a total of \$50,000 to cover expenses and pay down debt. And through the 100 Club of Illinois Educational Assistance Program, children and other dependents of fallen first responders receive financial assistance for their undergraduate, vocational, or graduate education. The organization has pledged to provide more than \$15 million to assist family members who will be enrolled in school over the next 24 years. “We’re with these families forever,” says CEO Caitlyn Brennan. “I go to graduations and weddings; I meet new grandchildren. We first get to know families at a point of tragedy, but we’re there to see them grow through it.”

In response to increased calls for assistance, the 100 Club expanded its programming in March 2021 to support active-duty first responders as well. It now offers mental-health and trauma counseling, peer support, critical-incident debriefs, and other services to promote wellness and resiliency among first responders and their families. It also provides emergency financial assistance to active-duty first-responder families in case of injury, adverse circumstances, or other hardships.

**How the Satter Foundation has helped:** The work of the 100 Club of Illinois is never finished, so the Satter Foundation provides reliable, year-after-year support to help the organization apply its expertise to serve families in need and to roll out new programming, such as the active-duty support services it began this past year.

**What’s next:** Illinois is home to 80,000 first responders—which means that despite its significant expansion in geography and programming, much work remains for the 100 Club of Illinois to fully meet the needs of this large community. The organization has engaged numerous on-the-ground partners to expand its resilience and wellness initiatives statewide, and it is using the lessons it learns to evolve its services and approaches over time. “There are so many obstacles for our first responders in this moment,” says Brennan. “We’re determined to do what it takes to support them, so that they can continue to show up for their communities every day.”

## Its Impact:

To date, the 100 Club of Illinois has provided more than \$13 million in assistance to 298 families of fallen first responders, including 28 in the past two years alone. In March 2020, the organization expanded its reach from Chicago and its surrounding counties to the entire state of Illinois, responding to a never-before-seen increase in tragic incidents and requests for assistance. Only weeks later, the COVID-19 pandemic struck, making this expansion even more timely. “Throughout this difficult year, our first responders stayed out there helping,” says Brennan. “It’s an honor for us to help them in return.”

# INVEST FOR KIDS

Invest For Kids is dedicated to supporting high-impact nonprofit organizations that support underserved Chicago youth. Its flagship event is an annual investment conference that brings together investment-management thought leaders to share new ideas and, at the same time, raises funds to expand opportunity for the city's youth.

**Its methods:** “The goal of Invest For Kids is to support Chicago’s young people,” says Katie Hurley Wales, the organization’s executive director. “By extension, we’re advancing their families, their communities, and the city as a whole.” Founded by Ron Levin and Ben Kovler in 2009—in true start-up fashion, with a business plan written on the back of a napkin—Invest For Kids hosts an annual investment conference that assembles investment professionals for a half day of innovative presentations from the country’s investment-management luminaries. Every penny of the conference’s proceeds—more than \$18 million so far—goes toward a slate of high-impact nonprofit organizations that work to positively change the lives of Chicago youth.

In 2021, Invest For Kids reviewed more than 100 applicants before investing in six nonprofits: organizations committed to promoting academic success, closing the digital divide, counseling and mentoring students coping with trauma, and preparing students for career success. “We support small, high-performing organizations that can use the grants we provide to really make a big difference,” says Levin. And because the event’s cofounders and their families underwrite all costs associated with the conference, 100 percent of the proceeds are donated to grantees, giving them what they need to maximize their impact.

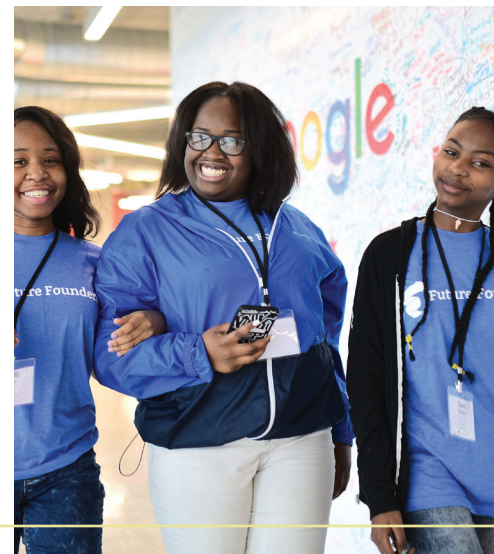
Over the years, Invest For Kids has also launched new initiatives that build on the momentum of its signature conference. These include the Emerge Summer Career and Leadership Program, a paid summer internship and leadership-development program that Invest For Kids created and supports in partnership with Chicago Scholars. Through Emerge, participating college students are matched with mentors in a variety of industries, including finance, law, health, technology, and the nonprofit sector. Since the program began in 2018, Invest For Kids has connected 175 high-performing college students with internships at businesses and community organizations across the city.

**How the Satter Foundation has helped:** The foundation values and admires Levin’s and Kovler’s entrepreneurial spirit, which is infused in the work of the organization, as well as their ability to make a huge impact on the lives of children across Chicago.

**What’s next:** “Our mission to support Chicago youth hasn’t changed over the years, but we’re constantly thinking about ways to do so more effectively,” says Barbara Wolf, the director of giving. Invest For Kids is identifying ways to increase its footprint and its impact, from bringing on new advisory committee members to creating an enhanced sponsorship program that gives contributors more acknowledgment and networking opportunities, and also allows them to connect more deeply with the organization’s mission and impact. “We want to make sure our donors feel connected to our mission and know about the good work they’re supporting,” says Wales.

## Its Impact:

Throughout its 13-year history, Invest For Kids has welcomed more than 10,000 investment professionals to its annual conference, raised more than \$18 million for Chicago youth-serving nonprofits, and awarded grants to more than 75 nonprofit organizations that have served thousands of Chicago-area youth. “Grantees tell us that our funding is an endorsement of their work,” says Wolf. “It validates their approach and can help them find more people to support them.” Past grantees have used Invest For Kids’ backing to serve a greater number of youth, bring on more staff members, and add new program areas to their offerings.
